This was followed by a memorial service to honor the twenty-four Oahu BWA members who passed away in the last year. The memorial sermon was delivered by Rev. Shingo Furusawa, minister advisor of the Oahu United BWA.

The Convention keynote speaker was Coach Hayashi, a funny guy, with lots of advice and tips on how to avoid threatening situations—in the parking lot, elevators, cars, streets, and even at home. His eye-opening lecture with a twist of humor certainly seemed to have caught everyone's attention. There was much laughter throughout his funny and practical presentation. His three "L's"—LISTEN! General membership meeting was conducted by Oahu Rengo President Takako Desaki of Pearl City. Installation of officers for 2010 followed, with Waipahu's Janet Yoshida as President-elect.



Instead of the usual summary of our activities since the last issue, (not that we haven't been busy with the usual temple doings such as our participation in the Double Commemoration, BBQ chicken fundraiser, special Dharma Session with the Rev. Masao Kodani and our New Year party) this time we feature three remarkable ladies who although they are in their 90's, are still active in our organization.



Shigeko Gushiken was born on Maui but moved to Okinawa with her mother when she was three years old. After attending elementary and high schools there, she returned to Hawaii at age 23. After her marriage to James S. Gushiken who owned and operated a hotel, she

started coming to Jikoen at the old Houghtailing address because he was a very close friend of the Rev. Chiro Yosemori, its founder.

She remembers all the oldtimers of those days and the activities such as making andagi and sushi, helping at their annual fair, feeding college students from Okinawa and going on day trips around the island to visit other temples.

She moved to Japan to live with her daughter Amy Saito and her family in the 1978 to help care for her newly-born granddaughter Ai and returned to Hawaii with them in the early 1990's.

Today, although wheel-chair bound, Mrs. Gushiken still attends Sunday services and special activities such as our Shinnen Enkai, thanks to the loving care of her family, especially granddaughter Ai. Also regularly attending our services is Ai's toddler, Elise, making FOUR generations of the Gushiken family present at all our functions – what a great distinction for Jikoen! *see Jikoen on next page*.

Gladys Higa has lived on Oahu all her life, in Waianae, Wahiawa, Waipahu, and now Mililani. Until only a few years ago, she did all her own driving.

Harue Uechi began her life at Hilo's Yamanoha hospital, but because she was her family's first grandchild, her grandpa took charge of her early upbringing on his pig farm in Alae on the Hamakua

coast. Her strong ties to her grandparents continued even after she moved to Honolulu with her family, with visits back to the Big Island every summer.

Kalihiwaena, Fern and Kalakaua Intermediate were the schools she attended as a youngster. Instead of going on to McKinley High, she enrolled at the Honpa Hongwanji Japanese school for girls while also working at the Hasegawa book store.

Her first contact with Jikoen was when Rev. Yamasato began holding services in the old clubhouse deep in Kalihi Valley. She remembers going on picnics with the group, which included old friends like Hiroko Shimabukuro and Shizuko Uezu.

When Jikoen's first temple was built on Houghtailing Street, Harue and her husband were one of the first couples to be married there in a very simple ceremony. However, after the children were born, she became too busy with them and her work to attend services. Later after the move to the present location on School Street, she resumed her temple

No temple services in August provides time to enjoy other fun fellowship. On August 2<sup>nd</sup>, eight members of Mililani's Lotus Connection provided a relax-




