HONOLULU UNITED BWA: SHARING PEACE THROUGH THE ARTS June Sutterfield and Lois Toyama

The Honolulu United Buddhist Women's Association's annual education workshop held on June 21 at Jikoen Hongwanji featured experiential art workshops with the theme, "Sharing Peace through the Arts." About 85 persons attended and thanks to Alan Kubota, a professional photographer and PBA instructor, who provided a short dharma message. Participants engaged in several ses-

sions from Collage Creations, Haiku, Kapa Printing, Bodhi Leaf Print, Lotus flower, Exploring Photography and Bento Art.

A display of BWA and Sangha members art expression ranging from paintings, calligraphy and crafts exemplified that indeed "BWA's Got Talent." The attendees generously donated \$1,390 to the HHMH Ministerial Training Fund and donated over \$600 to support two organiza-

tions which work with youth in our community to promote peace through art.

In a recent ceremony at the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, Myrna Nishihara, president of the Honolulu United Buddhist Women's Association, presented checks to Vince Hazen, Director of the Honolulu Museum of Art School and to Cari Lee, a co-founder of Ohana Arts.

The Honolulu Museum of Art's "Art to Go" program offers art experiences to students in schools throughout Oahu. The program develops creativity, self-reflection, and cultural understanding.

Ohana Arts engages youth in musical and performing arts programs which promote the mission, "promoting peace and world friendship through the universal language of the arts." Composer Jenny Taira and lyricist Laurie Rubin, Ohana Arts co-founders, are currently working on an original musical, "Peace on Your Wings." This performance, inspired by the life of Sadako Sasaki, a victim of the after-effects of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima, will premiere on November 20-22 at Leeward Community College Theater and will tour statewide in January and February.




HAWAII ISLAND UNITED BWA

The North Hawaii Hospice hosts, with the Fairmont Orchid at the Coconut Grove, a Floating Lantern Ceremony, to honor and remember loved ones. This community event was held on August 24, 2014. Lynn and Miles Okumura have spearheaded this project and Kamuela and Honokaa BWAs members have gotten involved. Previously Rev. Yagi and now Rev. Furusawa was asked to participate. We generally assist in preparing lanterns as an annual BWA project. Hopefully more of our temple members and other BWAs will attend in the future.

Admission is free to this event and you may purchase a lantern (\$10) for inscribing messages/decorations. A program of chanting, prayers, taiko drumming, music and hula is followed by the lantern release. Everyone sends their lighted lanterns and is an awe-inspiring moment as you see a "sea of light".





Mrs. Motoe Tada, a member of Honpa Hongwanji Hilo Betsuin, passed away on July 5, 2014 at the age of 93. At the 59th Hawaii Island United BWA Convention in October 2013, a Resolution of Appreciation was presented to her and this same resolution was forwarded to the 12th BWA State Membership Conference held in Kona on May 3-4, 2014 and adopted. While the entire resolution can be found in the State Conference program

booklets, here are some excerpts:

WHEREAS, it is a tradition within the Hawaii Island United Hongwanji BWA to recognize and honor members of the Association who have demonstrated extraordinary service to the Association, HHMH and to the community by the generosity of time and spirit of its members, and

WHEREAS, MOTOE TADA of Hilo, Hawaii, who was born into a Buddhist family, an active member of the Hilo Hongwanji, BWA, a steadfast participant in island wide, statewide, worldwide BWAs, 93 years of age, is one of those exceptional members who lives the life of Nembutsu, and

WHEREAS, MOTOE TADA served as the first President of the Hilo Betsuin's BWA, who was not the



spouse of a minister (which was the practice from 1913-2004), for her first term in 2005-2006; Vice President from 1997-2004 and 2007-2008; Director from the Hawaii Island United BWA to the Federation of BWAs from 1997-2008;

WHEREAS, MOTOE TADA is part of the foundation for the Association as it exists today...a historian with a wealth of information on the life and times of the Hongwanji and a strong, excellent role model for Buddhist women.

Mrs. Tada also served as President of Hawaii Island United BWA, and Hilo Betsuin Kyodan Board. In May, we last saw her smiling at the 12th BWA State Membership Conference in Kona. We offer our deepest sympathies to her two sons, Norman and Lloyd and to her five grandchildren.

The Ingo (Posthumous Title) of MON-KO-IN which means "One who comprehends the Buddha's Light" was taken from Hymn of the Pure Land, was conferred by Bishop Eric Matsumoto and presented at the Funeral Service. Namu Amida Butsu.
