The Buddhist Women's Association had to be creative in their support for peace and equality on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day this year. Because of the pandemic, the annual parade was cancelled. To replace the marching unit which we usually have, we had to go virtual. Thanks to a committee made up of Irene Nakamoto, Penny Atcheson, Dave Atcheson, Liane Viloria, Sharon Nohara, Lois Toyama, Carol Valentine, and Claire Tamamoto and some expert editing by Jenny Taira of Ohana Arts, we were able to produce a twelve-minute video tribute which is available on the Kyodan YouTube Channel. During the first week, the video has been viewed over 350 times. Mahalo to Rev. Blayne Higa of Kona Hongwanji for his inspiring

Dharma talk which is on the video and to the students of Ohana Arts for their beautiful performance of the song, "Peace on Your Wings." If you haven't seen it yet, be sure to take a look.

In addition to the video, a menu of

activities that temples could do was sent to BWA Units statewide. Many temples draped their Shinran Shonin statues with tsuru lei in honor of Dr. King. Pacific Buddhist Academy students strung lei and draped them on the Shinran statue at Hawaii Betsuin.

Honolulu dharma schools, Mililani Dharma School and Kona Hongwanji Preschool students made posters

featuring Dr. King's teachings. Puna Hongwanji conducted a community seminar as well as a food drive in commemoration of Dr. King's Poor People's Campaign. Individuals made monetary contributions to their local food banks.

Thank you for all of your efforts to make

this a meaningful statewide effort. A member of the NAACP parade planning committee made this comment in response to your efforts, "Thank you for being who you are. Believe it or not, I look at your organization as my sisters. The Hawaii Buddhist Women's Association has shown honor for Dr. King, and for that alone I am grateful."

I'd like to conclude with a quote from Amanda Gorman's poem which she read at President Biden's inauguration:

"... For there is always light

If only we're brave enough to see it.

If only we're brave enough to be it."




With the same generosity and gratitude, Lihue Hongwanji held a Rice Roundup on November 14. It was a wonderful

Oahu's bylaws allowed electronic meetings only for Board meetings. To amend our Bylaws to allow electronic meetings for all our meetings, which had to be done in person at an annual membership

The amendment was effective immediately upon approval, and more Oahu United members then participated via Zoom to elect officers for 2021. The Memorial Service officiated by Rev. in the temple, and workshops on card and envelope making. They provided gift bags to the Aiea Hongwanji Preschoolers and the kupuna at the Lotus Adult Day Care, and plan to present 30 walker bags to the daycare in February.

Mililani Hongwanji BWA members have been meeting via Zoom since October. They observed Martin Luther King Jr. Day on January 18 by making a lei of peace of origami cranes for their temple statute of Shinran Shonin, and will have a trial Country Store in February. They are presently collecting applications for their annual BWA Scholarship and canned goods and monetary donations for their Dana Day donation to the Hawaii Food Bank.

Honpa Hongwanji Hawaii Betsuin Martin Luther King, Jr. Day 2021 and New BWA Officers








