Message from the President: Linda Nagai

I am humbled that you have entrusted me to be your President for the next two years, and I believe it will be an exciting two years. With our virtual 14th BWA State Membership Conference at our heels, the 17th World Buddhist Women's Convention in Kyoto in May 2023, trotting behind, and COVID still hanging around in our space. A passage from "Lady Kujo's Selected Works" reflects what we have been going through these past two years and as Jodo Shinshu followers we have persevered "Although nature is completely unbiased, it seems to be constantly challenging us. But even in the face of relentless testing, true travelers never begrudge giving their last ounce of effort."

As I read this passage, I reflected on what our BWA ladies have been doing during the pandemic. Janet Honda shared her vision for the BWA to become visible in the community. The BWA participated in the Martin Luther Jr. parade until 2020 when COVID temporarily forced the parade to take to the sidelines. However that didn't stop our ladies. In 2021 our BWA ladies, with the assistance of Jenny Taira of Ohana Arts, produced a twelve-minute video tribute honoring Dr. King's legacy which was available on YouTube. With the parade being cancelled again this year due to COVID, our ladies in the Honolulu and Oahu districts assisted the Honpa Hongwanji and the Honolulu Hawaii NAACP with a Food and Hygiene Products Drive. The drive was very successful and supported Martin Luther King Jr.'s philosophy as stated in his Nobel Prize acceptance speech in 1964: "I have the audacity to believe that peoples everywhere can have three meals a day for their bodies, education, and culture for their minds.



and dignity, equality, and freedom for their spirits." Our BWA ladies are out in full force working to keep Dr. King's dream alive, sharing the dharma, and putting into action the Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii's slogan, "Building Healthy Sanghas: Connecting with Others."


The Maui United BWA held its 66th Fall General Assembly on November 20, 2021, with

HIUHBWA Education Seminar

Kona Hongwanji BWA hosted the HIUHBWA Education Seminar on October 23, 2021, via Zoom. The Seminar, "On White Ashes—Advanced Care Planning and Buddhist Wisdom for End-of-Life," covered important topics concerning health care decisions and wishes for care. Approximately 45 people participated in this Seminar.

Ms. Jeannette Koijane, Executive Director of Kokua Mau, covered topics such as:

- The importance of meaningful conversations with loved ones about what matters most;
- What are Advance Directives, and who should have one;
- What is a POLST (Providers Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment) and who needs one:
- What is Palliative Care and who could benefit from it:
- What Hospice is and why early referrals to Hospice can benefit individuals and their loved ones;
- What is the Our Care Our Choice Act.

Rev. Blayne Higa of Kona Hongwanji presented his views on "Shin Buddhist Wisdom for End of Life." He shared Kona Hongwanji's Guidebook for End-of-Life and the benefit of individuals preparing "Spiritual Wills." The Seminar was recorded, so that those who were not able to participate could watch the video at a later date.

Over the years, it has become a tradition in January for Honolulu United BWA to participate in the MLK Jr. Day Parade in Waikiki. This year, **Hawaii Betsuin's BWA** was invited to honor Martin Luther King Jr.'s legacy of peace and service in a different way.

On MLK Jr. Day, Jan. 17, 2022, the Honolulu Hawaii NAACP and Honpa Hongwanji partnered to hold a Food and Hygiene Products Collection on Oahu and one of the three Drive Thru and Drop Off points was Hawaii Betsuin's back parking lot. The first stop in the Drive Thru was the Welcome Station – where the BWA mounted its iconic bamboo poles strung with colorful origami peace cranes. From 9:00 – 11:15 a.m., PBA students greeted

donors who were dropping off non-perishable food items for Hawaii Foodbank and period and hygiene products for Ma'i Movement Hawai'i. Hawaii Betsuin BWA members served as greeters from 11:15 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. All greeters thanked each donor with a "mahalo" packet of three lovely origami peace cranes, folded by BWA members, and information about the donation recipients.

Many BWA members from Hawaii

Betsuin, Jikoen and Moiliili donated food, hygiene products, and checks to the Hawaii Foodbank and Ma'i Movement. Honolulu Hawaii NAACP volunteers picked up donations collected at the other two points (Windward Buddhist Temple and Aiea Hongwanji) and organized all the boxes in Hawaii Betsuin's Lotus Room for pickup the following day. A total of 3,480 pounds of food was collected for Hawaii Foodbank, and Ma'i Movement received several SUV loads of period and hygiene products.

The willingness of volunteers to give their all for this event was truly inspiring! What a marvelous MLK Jr. Day of Service 2022!

The Annual OUHHBWA Convention/ Seminar was held on November 13, 2021 in person at Aiea Hongwanji and on Zoom. The guest speaker for the Memorial Service was Rev. David Fujimoto on Zoom. General Workshop speakers were Dr. Kevin Kawamoto, UH Manoa, who spoke on Understanding Older Adults who have Communication Challenges: Strategies for Improving Interactions, and Cindy Ujimori who taught us How to Make a 5-1/2" Dish Garden. Officers for 2022 were elected and installed, and the Bylaws were amended to be gender neutral and to create an At-Large Unit to represent active members without an Oahu United/ Federation BWA affiliated unit.

At the 4th Quarter Board Meeting in December, the Federation Director and the representative to the Student Exchange Committee were selected, and United dues were raised.

MLK Drive-Thru Food and Hygiene Products Collection: This year instead of participating in the annual MLK Jr. Parade and Unity Rally in Waikiki, the Honolulu Hawaii NAACP sponsored a drive-thru collection of nonperishable food and feminine hygiene products on Oahu and asked the Honpa Hongwanji to be the host for the three collection sites. Aiea Hongwanji did the collection for Oahu District where volunteers from groups like the Scouts, Jr. YBA, the Kiwanis/Key Club, Democrats, Prince Hall Shriners, and the Aiea BWA, Dharma School and Board members worked in shifts to collect and box the donations and hand out peace cranes. BWA members from other


temples also came by with their collected donations.

Like **Ewa**, **Wahiawa**, and **Waialua** Hongwanji BWAs, **Waianae** will no longer be a unit of the OUHHBWA and Federation as of January 1, 2022. But individual members are still welcome to join as At-Large members of the newly created **At-Large Unit**, which currently composed of members from Ewa and Wahiawa Hongwanjis will be choosing voting representatives to the OUHHBWA Board of Directors soon.

Mililani hopes to start in-person meetings in 2022. Officers for 2022 were installed on January 2. In lieu of an in-person bazaar, they have decided on a Zippy's fundraiser. Mililani Hongwanji BWA is once again offering a \$1,500 scholarship for post high school schooling or training to its BWA members, their children and grandchildren. The scholarship is one of the major programs of the BWA, which has awarded scholarships to over 15 applicants.

Pearl City is also planning to hold in-person meetings in 2022. They have been preparing take home refreshments for major services and are working on White Elephant sales for the Kyodan. Recently their ground floor storeroom was flooded because of heavy rain.




